





Our Revenues



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
2021 TOTAL REVENUE \$43,935,413



2021 Accomplishments

Franklin County's oldest and largest community health center (FQHC)

- Awarded \$29.4M in grants; 21new grants
- Broke ground on the New Alvis/Alum Creek Health Center
- Opened two new mobile health centers
- Successful 2021 Financial Audit
- Partnership with Groveport Madison Schools SBHC/Community Center Approved
- Established new HCJA Scholarship Program
- Achieved OHMAS/Licensure Certification
- Preceptor program 65 students strong in 2021
- No Staff Layoffs with increased Healthcare Benefits
- Hired 136 new employees
- Invested more than \$900,000 in facilities, capital, maintenance and operations
- Invested more than \$250,000 in communications, education, outreach and awareness


